Two of our board members' employers had volunteer programs that matched grants based on total volunteer time.

What steps did you take to implement this effort? (Remember that other chapter leaders will use this to replicate the effort. Be specific) As the board, we look at our chapter two ways. Primarily as a professional membership, we look for ways to add value for members. Secondarily, we are a non-profit that qualifies for donations.

We started looking at what other non-profits were doing, and you know what we found? Not only do companies match donations, but there are companies that provide grants to their employees based on their volunteerism. We received two such grants this month totaling \$1,500!

Corporate social responsibility (CSR) is important for major corporations to attract talent. See the connection with ATD? It's a win-win when the corporations appreciate employees who embrace its culture. It helps the employee get recognition, not just for volunteering, for the type of organization. It's obvious to every manager that their employee who is volunteering at ATD is an employee who is committed to their career and to the company.

There are four types of volunteer grants:

1. Individual: Companies may offer individual grants based on volunteer hours completed during personal time. Microsoft, for instance, pays \$25 an hour (no minimum) to be accrued for the non-profit.

2. Team: Team grants, of \$500 or \$1,000, promote leadership in garnering a group of employees to collectively volunteer or to register their donations together.

3. Paid Time Off: Companies may pay the employee their full-time wage for manager-approved volunteer time during the workday. Many times, these parlay into team-building events, such as building a house with Habitat for Humanity or sorting food for a food bank.

4. Annual awards: Companies use annual awards to recognize their top volunteers.

We asked our board members to review their company's policies and see if they qualified. It turned out that had two board members, Cindy Alderman and Susan Wines, employed by Thomson Reuters whose grants were expanded in 2020 to include virtual volunteering. Based on Cindy and Susan's volunteerism for the board, Thomson Reuters provided two grants, one for \$1,000 and one for \$500. Thank you, Thomson Reuters!

In our January board meeting, we will ask our new board members and volunteers to check their company's policies for volunteerism. You should, too.
