#### Moola in Michigan

Women in 17 jobs earn more than men do in the same jobs—at least, they do in Michigan.

Sheet metal worker, crane operator, and telephone repairman (oops, repairperson) are among the jobs in which the women make more money than the men with the same jobs, according to Michigan census data. Analysts say that the difference may be due to the low number of women in those professions and that more of them tend to have college degrees, unlike their male counterparts.

For instance, of the 137 female crane operators surveyed, 13 percent have college degrees; only 2 percent of the male crane operators have college diplomas.

But in most jobs in Michigan, women make \$.69 to a man's \$1; the U.S. average ranges from \$.74 to \$.77 on the dollar.
