CROSS-CULTURAL TRAINING

Griggs Productions interactive training program, No Potential Lost, includes three CD-ROMs: *Personal Effectiveness, Interpersonal Effectiveness*, and *Organizational Effectiveness*. They are designed for individuals, teams, and organizations that "face the challenges of an increasingly diverse workforce and the globalization of business." Examples of interactions with employees and customers teach lessons in dealing with cultural differences.

Personal Effectiveness explores self-awareness and urges individuals to take personal responsibility for their performance through increased sensitivity and skill building.

Interpersonal Effectiveness promotes mutual responsibility for teamwork, managing conflict, improving customer relations, and building trust in a diverse workplace.

In the third program, *Organizational Effectiveness*, trainees can participate in an interactive "walkabout" through a company, visit several de-



partments, and observe video interaction. Then, they are asked to assess situations, identify problems, and recommend changes.


Concepts in the book are paired with examples from "all walks of life."





To help companies and employees overcome "business illiteracy," Miller and her company, Human Resource


Management Systems, have created "What'\$ My Bottom Line?," a training game that "paints the big picture of business."
