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A Multimedia Cost/Benefit **Analysis**

Multimedia may be the latest in technology, but is it cost-effective?

Here's a way to compute your organization's potential payback from using multimedia. The Multimedia Cost Model software program from Comsell Training enables a company to calibrate more than 50 of its own cost variables in order to compare multimedia training with traditional training. The results are presented in three formats: the total annualized cost of delivering training, the cost per student, and the time required to achieve payback.

Variable factors include such direct costs as the trainer's salary and travel expenses, and such indirect costs as loss of productivity while employees are receiving off-site training. A "drilldown" feature enables users to examine the results in detail, starting from the bottom-line summaries, which also can be used to create reports for top-level managers.
