

Reclaim Your Domain

Not so long ago, companies went to court or paid through the nose to boot cyber squatters from desirable, easy-to-remember domain names. In fact, pickins were so slim that if you could think of it, somebody had already claimed it. Eventually, the U.S. Commerce Department's Internet Corporation for Assigned Names and Numbers www.icann.org set about creating new suffixes to handle the domain demand. The result? Seven new suffixes, many of which are already appearing online.

Four suffixes are general domains. They include .biz for business purposes, .name for individuals, and .pro for professionals such as lawyers and accountants. Also included is .info, which is open to any use. The remaining three suffixes are more specific: .museum for museum groups, .aero for the aviation industry, and .coop for co-operative businesses and organizations.

Of course, now that so many dot.coms have turned into dot.bombs and cyber squatters have wearied waiting for the payoff—and tired of paying the annual registration fee-many .com domains are returning to the pool. Now may be a good time to scoop up that domain you wanted years ago.

As for the new suffixes, each is managed by one of several companies, or registries, contracted by ICANN. Sales of the domain names are handled in turn by numerous registrars accredited by the respective registry. Sound confusing? It's not. Registries simply handle the sale and management of domain names. You can obtain listings of accredited registrars at the ICANN site (1) www.icann.org. Prices for a domain run US\$10 to \$35 a year.

Take Control

If you really want to speed up your Web

connection, drop the mouse and put your fingers back on the keyboard. Ctrl+O

In Microsoft's Internet Explorer and recent versions of Netscape Navigator, typing Ctrl+O opens a dialog box that allows you to type in the Website of your choice. Hit enter and you're on your way. There's no need to type in *http://*; just the three wwws will suffice. If the address isn't on the Web, leave the wwws off.

As an added feature, Explorer users can type Ctrl+O to open folders or files on their hard drive or network. Just type in the location, such as C:\My Documents. The folder will appear in your Internet Explorer window. Unfortunately, that can't be done with Netscape Navigator, but the two browsers share another Ctrl+O feature.

Instead of entering the Internet address of a search engine, type search in the Ctrl+O dialog box then the term you're looking for. Once you hit enter, a search will be performed at the browser's respective search site. For the record, search results provided by Microsoft's

MSN.com are consistently more on target than Netscape's, and Explorer recognizes registered keywords, such as Smithsonian, to take you directly to the corresponding Website.

CtrI+E

Internet Explorer also offers a more powerful option for Internet searches, Ctrl+E. Users of Explorer 5.0 can call on this shortcut to open a separate search window within their browser's main window.

Just type in the terms you'd like to search for and a customizable group of search engines will generate your results. What's more, clicking on a result opens the link in the adjacent window without losing your search results. To hide the search window, type Ctrl+E again.

Ctrl+N

Would you like to open a new browser window without leaving your current one? Type Ctrl+N, Ctrl+O, and the Internet address. Who knew surfing could be so simple?
